July

Risk Factors: Day Driving, 0 Passengers, Operating Stereo Equipment

Increased Driving Risk to Teenagers: 300%

August

Risk Factors: Day Driving, 0 Passengers, Eating/Drinking, (non-alcohol)

Increased Risk to Teenagers: 600%

September

Risk Factors: Day Driving, 2 Passengers, Operating a Phone(includes texting)

Increased Risk to Teenagers: 585%

October

Risk Factors: Day Driving, 0 Passengers, Adjusting Hair/Make-Up & Phone Operation

Increased Risk to Teenagers: 700%

When To Rotate Your Tires

The only thing between you and the road are your tires, so it makes sense to make sure they're in the best shape possible.

Your daily driving habits will usually determine how frequently you will need to replace your tires. Rotating them will improve their longevity by distributing the wear more evenly. Rotate the tires about every 6,000 to 8,000 miles, or more frequently if you drive a four-wheel vehicle. To be extra sure, check the tire manufacturers' recommendations.

In addition to scheduling regular tire rotations, you should also get in the habit of performing regular visual checks. Look for uneven wear, bubbles in the rubber or even air leaks. Run the tire irregular in shape or shows imperfections in the sidewalls.

It is also very important to keep your tires properly inflated. Properly inflated tires help improve gas mileage, the practicality and longevity.

If you're not sure you have enough tire tread, insert a penny. If you can see the top of Lincoln's head, your tread is too low for

Want to be as safe as possible? Follow these tips provided by Crime Dog:

- Lock doors and take keys with you when you leave the car. As many as 1 million cars had the keys left in them.
- Keep your gas tank full, and your vehicle is in good running condition. This will prevent breakdowns that could occur in unfamiliar areas or inconvenient locations.
- Let people know where you are going and when you plan to return.
- When heading out into a parking lot, already have your keys in your hands. Don't stand at your car door, rifling through a purse or bag.
- If you think someone is following you in a parking lot, keep your car in a well-lit and busy area. If you have a cell phone, call 911.
- Before putting the car in drive, make sure everyone is well clear.
- Lock car doors and keep windows rolled up.
- If your car becomes disabled, pull over as far as possible, turn on your emergency flashers and stay with the car. If a stranger offers to help, ask for a name and phone number or her to call police to assist you.
